

Exploration of Dilemma of Young India in The Coral Tree

The story has two characters belonging to differing age groups. The protagonist is a young man in his twenties, whereas, the other character is a little girl. They both have desire to travel the world. They do not want to be bound to one place, but would like to explore the unknown and experience the unseen.

The story begins with the narration of the protagonists' thoughts. He was waiting for his tonga to take him to the railway station and then from Bombay he would sail for England. He wishes to begin a new life in a new land, leaving all his past behind. The bungalow in which his ancestors had lived was not merely a building of stone and bricks; but it was an important way to be connected to his forefathers. The bungalow had infinite memories of the precious lives spent there. But now he realized that with him gone overseas, it would just remain dormant in

his mind and would be remembered occasionally.

I was in my 20s and I began to earn a living and felt I had certain responsibilities as well.... There would be work, interviews a job, a different kind of life so many things that this bungalow of my grandfather would be remembered fitfully in moments of reflection.

His aspirations had taken prime place in his life. To him living his dream of living and working abroad on a foreign soil was more important than preserving his heritage. But even after making all the arrangements to move abroad and setting out to pursue his dreams, his heart was not happy. He woke up with a heavy heart. He was aware of his surroundings. He was fully awakened to the soil, rain, air and the colour of the morning.

When I woke up on the verendah I saw a grey morning smelling the rain of red earth I remembered that I had to go away.

The rain and the red earth are frequently mentioned in the story which shows that the protagonist is aware of his surroundings, the water and soil of his motherland which he is going to leave in a short while. Even his senses are reminding him of what he will be missing in future.

The interesting part of this short story is the conversation between the young man and the little girl. The girl comes to collect some flowers from the coral tree. When she is unable to pluck them the protagonist offers to help her. The little girl comes across as an independent child who at a tender age believes she can stay on her own. She expresses her desire to visit America, Africa, Japan, and Honolulu. The protagonist sees a reflection of himself in the little girl. In this conversation the readers get to know the conflicting emotions faced by the protagonist.

I felt a sudden nostalgic, longing for childhood and an urge to remain behind in my grandfather's house with its tangled memories of ghosts of yesteryears. But I was the only one left and what could I do except to climb the tamarind and jackfruit trees.

He is in two minds; he has an urge to remain behind in his ancestral house, but his desire to explore the world is



equally strong. He is arguing with himself that he has no option left but to leave. He is convincing himself that this is the best possible solution. There is an inner dialogue with himself.

...there's no one to help me. I am the last one to go. Not because I want to go but because I have to go.

He is not answerable to anyone regarding his decision of settling abroad, yet he is battling those thoughts. There is strong dilemma that he faces.

In literature, dilemma is a struggle occurring within the mind of a character. Therefore, it gives readers an insight into characters' lives. There may be a single or multiple dilemmas in a story.

Through these dilemmas we get an insight into the character's lives. It helps the readers to relate with their own situation and understand it better. In this instance, the dilemma is more of a moral nature.

A moral dilemma is a type of conflict that challenges a character's sense of morality and purpose. Moral dilemmas, also known as ethical dilemmas, occur when a character is given a chance to achieve a goal or to solve an external conflict-however, the action available to them runs at odds with the character's value system, effectively violating their own personal code of ethics. This dilemma sets off an episode of internal conflict, which can be the basis for a great story. Eventually, the protagonist will discover that their two types of conflict-external and internal-cannot be reconciled and a very difficult decision will be in order.

All these elements are experienced by the new and young India. They would like to explore the world and make a mark in the West. So what could be the solution to this situation? But stories like The Coral Tree help people to understand and possibly overcome their dilemma.
